What is Drama Online?

A research tool for the study of plays and playwrights, introducing new writers alongside the most iconic names in playwriting history, providing contextual and critical background through scholarly works and practical guides:

- From Aeschylus to the present day
- Arden Shakespeare series
- Realist works from Ibsen and Chekhov
- Major foreign works in translation: Bertolt Brecht, Luigi Pirandello, etc
- Comic masterpieces from Oscar Wilde and Noël Coward
- Modern classics from Tom Stoppard, Alan Bennett, etc

How can I access Drama Online?

Students and staff at BOVTS, LCDS, NSCD & Rambert can access Drama Online directly from any computer in their affiliate building. Simply go to <http://www.dramaonlinelibrary.com> and you will automatically be logged into the database.

You can also access the database on & off-site on any computer with internet access via an online gateway called OpenAthens. You will need a username and password to log into OpenAthens @ <http://www.openathens.net/>

You can also log into OpenAthens by following the 'Athens' link at the bottom of the CDD & NSCD websites.

N.B. OpenAthens is sometimes referred to as Athens or MyAthens.

How do I get a username and password to access OpenAthens?







Act 1, Scene 1

We are looking at part of the men's changing room of a public baths. It is ten o'clock in the morning. The cubicles are arranged in a row which conceal occupancy although they don't meet the glass doors at a place to shave facing front. Four of the cubicles have glass doors coming and going: 'Lobby', 'Pool', 'Showers', and, for the ladies, 'GENTS and EXIT may be used. One of the showers is a glass door. The lobby doors have MEN in reverse on the glass. When we encounter this scene, **Wates** is shaving. He is a man, normally impressively tailored and suave but at present he is a bit of a mess. He's wearing a hat, a pair of old-fashioned safety razor.

Before anything else happens we have a short Radio play. What we can hear is two people (a **Man** and a woman, **Hapgood**) talking to each other on shortwave Radio. The voices have a slight distort.

Radio OK, we have a blue Peugeot... stopping.
Single male.
It's not Georgi.
Anyone know him? No briefcase, repeat negative on briefcase.
Are you getting this, Mother? - we have the Peugeot but it's not Georgi.
He's crossing the road. Fancy tracksuit, running shoes. No sign of the follower. Are you getting this? - target is approaching, negative on Georgi, negative on briefcase, negative on follower, give me a colour.

Hapgood (on Radio) Green. You should be seeing Kerner.

Page numbers and lineation echo the print version of the work. Simply move the cursor over the text and they will appear

What are Play Tools?

Play Tools include a Character Grid to help you view where characters appear and with whom they interact in the selected play.

How do I make a Part Book (view the lines for my character only)?

If you select one of the dots in the Character Grid you'll be taken directly into the Reader to view the lines for that character and scene only.

Words and Speeches

On the same page as the Character Grid you will find a bar chart representing the shape of the play in terms of words and speeches. Selecting a character or specific characters from the Character Grid will change the graph to reflect the words and speeches for those selected. Hover over the bars for the precise word count.
